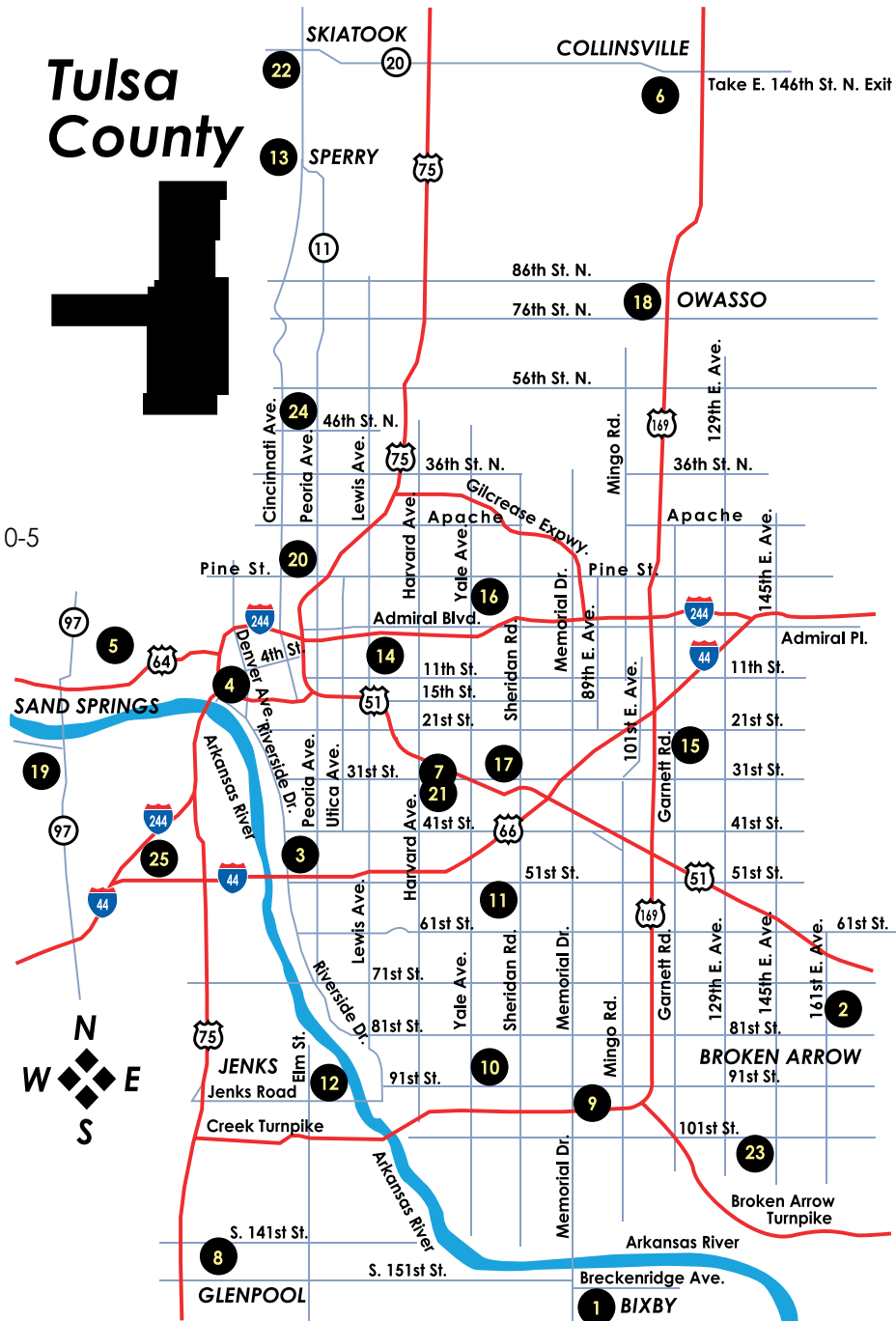

Your child heard stories from some of these books today.

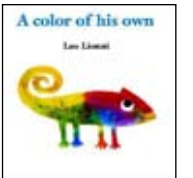

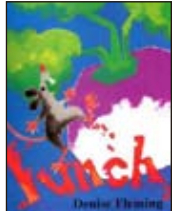
"A Color of His Own"

A little chameleon is distressed that he doesn't have his own color like other animals.



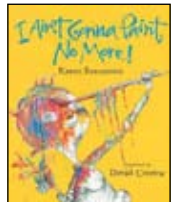
"Lunch"

In the rhythm of a familiar folk song, a child cannot resist adding one more dab of paint in surprising places.



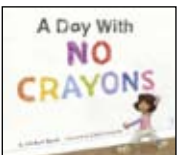
"Chuck Murphy's Color Surprises: A Pop-Up Book"

Reading With Your Child

You can teach your child to identify shades and hues of colors through everyday activities. For example, ask questions like "Have you seen my blue jacket? It is not light blue like the sky, but dark blue like a policeman wears." Point out different colors around the house or in the car. Talk about the way sunlight can make a color change.

Put your hands behind your back.

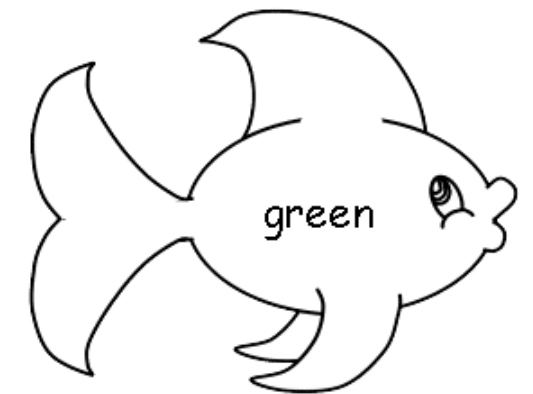
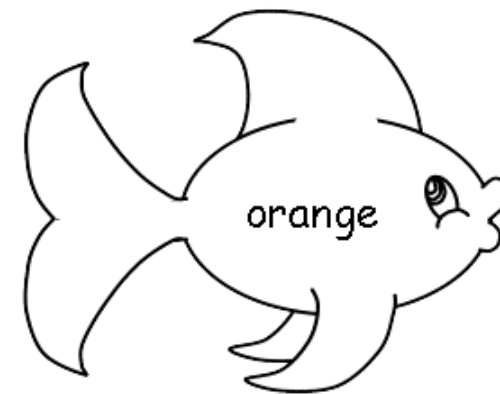
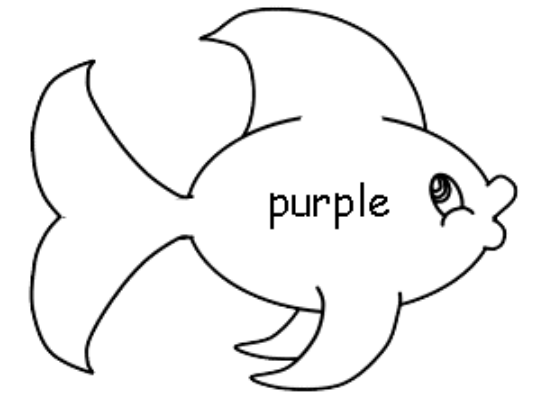
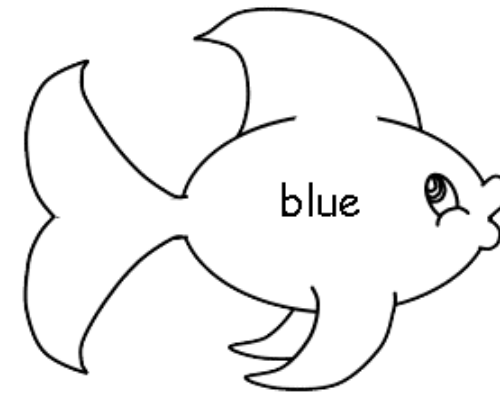
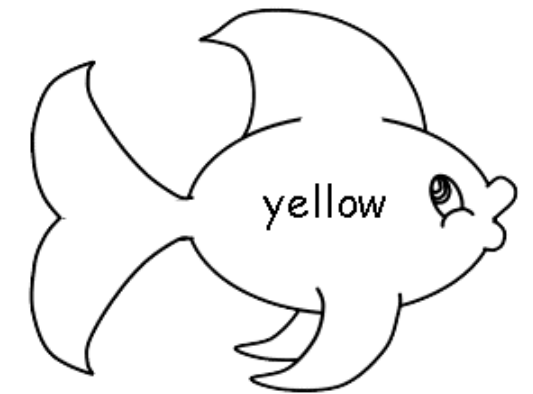
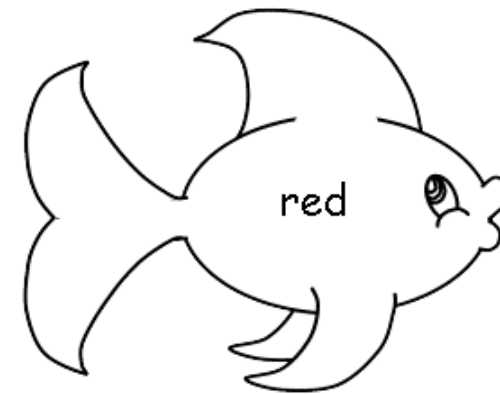


Supplementary Activity
