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Campus Safety

1. **Be Aware.** Pay attention to your surroundings and make eye contact with people.
2. **Trust Your Gut.** If you have a bad feeling, trust your instincts. Grab a friend or get help.
3. **Important Contact Information.** Keep numbers of Campus Police, family, your RA, etc. in a handy spot for quick access in an emergency.
4. **Call Campus Police.** Don't be afraid to contact campus police. They are there to help you.
5. **Avoid Being Alone.** The library basement may be a great place to study, but make sure other people are around studying too.

Universities typically have a campus safety orientation at the beginning of the year for students. Think about attending; you'll learn a lot about what to do if you need assistance.

Did you know? 1 in 6 adults in Tulsa cannot read the prescription label on a medicine bottle, understand a newspaper article, or enter complete information on an application. Become a tutor with the Ruth G. Hardman Adult Literacy Service.

To volunteer as a tutor you must:

- Be at least 18, a high school graduate or GED recipient.
- Satisfactorily complete the full tutor training workshop.
- Commit to tutoring at least once a week for one year.
- Read and write at an 8th grade level.

Tutoring is an excellent way to give back to your community! Not only will you do good work for others, but you will learn important skills, enhance your resume, and explore potential careers such as education and public service. It is a win-win situation for all those involved.
