Capsized! The Forgotten Story of the SS Eastland Disaster By Patricia Sutton

On July 24, 1915, the SS Eastland, filled to capacity with 2,500 aboard, capsized in the Chicago River while still moored to the pier. *Capsized!* details the events leading up to the fateful day and provides a nail-biting, minute-by-minute account of the ship's capsizing.



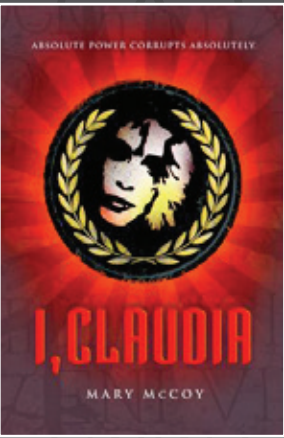

Getting to know Dame Hilary: A Q&A

England's two-time Man Booker Prize-winning historical novelist Dame Hilary Mantel will receive the Tulsa Library Trust's 2018 Peggy V. Helmerich Distinguished Author Award on Friday, Dec. 7 at a black-tie gala at Central Library, and will give a free public address on Saturday, Dec. 8 at 10:30 a.m. at Central Library.

Tulsa World Scene writer James D. Watts Jr. (JW) interviewed Hilary Mantel (HM) via email earlier this year. Several of the following questions and answers were reprinted by permission from Watts' blog post "ARTS: Helmerich Award winner Hilary Mantel on historical accuracy in fiction," published online March 18, 2018. The remainder are from an interview with Mantel conducted via email by Tulsa City-County Library (TCCL).

TCCL: Please elaborate on what it meant to you to win the Man Booker Prize each time and to win it twice, as that is such a phenomenal achievement!

HM: It's one of the world's leading literary awards and the most prestigious prize that is open to British writers. Winning it is a life-changing event. Since my first novel appeared in the mid-1980s, I had built up a good critical reputation and a dedicated — but small — readership. When I published *Wolf Hall* in spring 2010, my sales took off, but winning the prize later that year took me into a different league. Suddenly I had publishers in 37 countries, and was counting readers in millions, not thousands. It is rare to find that combination — critical and commercial success.

You can make a whole career as a Man Booker winner: waltz around the world being famous. All I wanted to do was get back to my desk, to finish *Bring Up the Bodies*, the next novel in the trilogy. To my astonishment, that book also won the

prize. Subsequently I became involved in the TV and stage productions — a creative interruption, one of the good kind. But for the last two years I've been working silently and intensely to complete the trilogy. No one has ever won the Man Booker three times, and I don't expect to. I just want to deliver the best book of which I'm capable. It's what I've been writing towards, all these years, the high point of my working life.

JW: The genesis of the "Wolf Hall" novels: What was it about this history and this character, Thomas Cromwell, that so captivated you? Was the idea that this would become a trilogy there at the start? Have you been surprised at the fervor with which these novels have been received by readers?

HM: I didn't know it would be a trilogy. But when I got into the material, I saw what opportunities it offered, and how much was unexplored — in history books, as well as in fiction. So the project flowered out from the middle.

Ten years on, my wonder at Thomas Cromwell is undimmed. It's not precisely admiration, more awe. He was a man from nowhere who in a stratified society climbed the ladder of power with great confidence and agility — in fact, it's more true to say that he brought his own ladder, and scaled the heights. His achievements were spectacular — both his personal achievements, and the changes he helped bring about in England and Europe.

I quickly saw that he was key to understanding the reign of Henry VIII. Though this was well-known to historians, Cromwell was an obscure character to the general public. But no more! It wasn't news to me that the Tudors are popular. But I didn't think the public would take so enthusiastically to a complex, nuanced, telling, which approached the material from

an unfamiliar angle. The books are demanding of the reader — they need commitment and attention. I didn't want to sell my story short. So I wrote it the way I thought it needed to be written, and was astonished and gratified that readers seemed to be waiting for it.

JW: I understand the third book in the series, *The Mirror and the Light*, will likely not be published until 2019 at the earliest. Has this novel been particularly difficult to write?

HM: The third novel of a big, fact-based trilogy is necessarily difficult because it carries so much back-story, and because it must stand up by itself, but also it must complete the arc of every character and storyline from the beginning of the venture. I am very ambitious for it; I want to show how memory changes the past, and how the stories we tell ourselves about our life are subject to revision. I want to cast new light, and question the nature of the mirror in which we see our own nature. I am more fascinated by the material than ever, deeply absorbed in it, and not going slower than I must. But life gets in the way, and has to be accommodated. Between books one and two I had a serious illness. Then last year, in the course of book three, my mother died. There were happier interruptions — working on the plays. And all sorts of side projects and diversions. I've got to the stage where the book is my life, and I can't go faster. But another year should see it home.

JW: In your memoir, *Giving Up the Ghost*, you talk about dealing with severe physical pain, and how a doctor thought the solution was for you to give up writing and work in a dress shop. I'm curious — did you ever send that doctor a copy of one of your books?

HM: That was what the 1970s were like. Young women trying to make their way were easily

undermined and written off as neurotic. This man thought my poor health was caused by over-ambition, whereas it was firmly rooted in physical illness, which could have been diagnosed if doctors had been less blinkered.

Maybe I should be grateful. I've never seen ambition as something to be ashamed of, and I suppose I was determined to prove people like that wrong. It took me to my mid-thirties to get into print, by which time I am sure the doctor in question had long forgotten me. But I've never forgotten him.

TCCL: For someone not familiar with your work but who is interested in reading some of your novels, which one would you recommend they read first and why?

HM: I'd ask whether they wanted a historical novel or a (roughly) contemporary one. A good compromise is *A Change of Climate*, which offers both. It is set partly in England in 1980, and partly in Africa in the late 1950s. One chapter takes place in a South African township in the time of apartheid, and another in a remote settlement in the Kalahari. It's the most traditional of my novels in storytelling terms, and has a grim secret at its heart. The downside is, it's the least funny.

TCCL: Any future novels that you plan to write or are in the works that you would like to share with us?

HM: I think what I'm going to do next is try to write a play, based on my short story *The Assassination of Margaret Thatcher*. As co-writer for the plays based on *Wolf Hall* and *Bring Up the Bodies*, I learned a lot, and I relish the challenge of the theatre. I've spent a lot of time in a room alone, locked in with dead people, so it could be time for some live teamwork.
