



Father Patrick Desbois

Father Patrick Desbois, Catholic priest and Vatican consultant, is founder and president of Yahad-In Unum. Through this international organization, Desbois has interviewed over 5,300 eyewitnesses of Jewish and Roma executions by Nazi mobile units at over 2,100 sites in Eastern Europe. In his 2008 National Jewish Book Award-winning *The Holocaust by Bullets: A Priest's Journey to Uncover the Truth Behind the Murder of 1.5 Million Jews*, Desbois documents for the first time each execution site in the Ukraine. Featured in several *New York Times* articles and on *60 Minutes*, Desbois' devotion to Holocaust and genocide research is evident in his urgency to uncover the truth.

University of Tulsa composer Joseph Rivers, J. Donald Feagin professor of music and film studies, also will perform his original musical elegy inspired by Yevgeny Yevtushenko's poem "Babi Yar."

Every March, the center presents the American Indian Festival of Words to celebrate the history, culture and achievements of American Indians through a series of enlightening family programs. This year's festival features the 2018 American Indian Circle of Honor presentation honoring retired educator Dr. Henrietta Mann. Induction into the Circle of Honor is a celebration of the honoree's actions in the face of adversity, commitment to the preservation of American Indian culture and legacy for future generations.

Where Everybody Knows Your Name

Eight-year-old Isabella Orrick once asked her mom if ever they moved away from the neighborhood "would we still come to our library?"

"I told her, of course, we will! Zarrow is our home library. We visit other libraries occasionally, but Zarrow is our library," said Janiel Orrick. "The staff here literally have watched my two daughters grow up over the past five years. When we come into the library or see one of the staff at the store or somewhere else, we always are greeted by name as we have built a special rapport with them. We love it here!"

Voracious readers, Janiel, Isabella and her 5-year-old sister Klarity Valdez regularly visit the library, loading up on books to take home (reading four to five every day!), attending all the programs, and utilizing the many free resources and services the Zarrow Regional Library has to offer the community.

"Our favorite thing is the programs, like Messy Art Club, and special parties like Narnia Wonderland," said Janiel. "The things they come

up with are so crafty, creative and so much fun. For the Narnia party, the kids and staff all dressed up as characters from the books. For the staff to be just as involved in the programming makes the children want to be more involved."

First opened in 1981, the West Regional Library was renamed the Henry Zarrow Regional Library in 2004, in recognition of a very special gentleman and supporter of the library. The clever blue bison statue in front of the building is called "Mr. Henry the Reading Buff," also in honor of the late Mr. Zarrow. In 2005, another sculpture, "Storytime for Two," was installed. Designed by local artist Rosalind Cook, it was donated by the Zarrow family in remembrance of Mr. Zarrow's late wife, Anne.

Like the library's namesake, the Zarrow Regional Library is very friendly and family-focused, said branch manager Ellen Cummings.

"We are a neighborhood gathering place where people can come and study, and families can spend quality time together," said Cummings. "We are a vital resource for the west region of Tulsa County and serve an increasingly diverse community as new growth develops in the area."

Zarrow Regional Library also is home to Tulsa City-County Library's American Indian Resource Center (AIRC), which provides access to more than 4,000 books, periodicals, and media for adults and children by and about American Indians, including historical

The center also hosts make-and-take workshops featuring traditional native arts at various times throughout the year. Past workshops included native patchwork, pottery, basket making, finger weaving and beading.



"All of these native arts traditionally were utilitarian items – things American Indians used in their daily lives. Although they are no longer used in that same fashion, they still are very much valued," said Runnels. "Our customers are really interested in and grateful for these make-and-take classes we offer. An elder once told me that this is something he should have learned as a young person but that there was no one to teach him."

As the only center of its kind in the state, the AIRC is vital to Oklahoma's many tribes.

"I first saw the native patchwork make-and-take event advertised on Facebook and shared it with others in my community. A group of us faithfully made the hour drive for each class," said Jacklyn

King, who lives in Stroud and is secretary for the Sac and Fox Nation. "As an elected tribal official this type of activity allowed me to put the day's stresses aside for a few hours and participate in something I truly enjoy which is producing anything that is handmade. The make-and-take program is important because it clearly motivated community involvement of all ages, both male and female; it promoted laughter and fellowship, and by the end of the series, learning a treasured native cultural art. I have continued working on my newly acquired patchwork skills at home and look forward to the next event the AIRC will be offering."
