SUBURBAN ACRES LIBRARY



remained a premier neighborhood attraction for residents in North Tulsa. Adjacent to Tulsa Public Schools' McLain Seventh Grade Academy on 46th Street North and North Garrison Avenue, the library is a community gathering place, as well as a safe place, for neighborhood children, youth and families.

Since first opening in 1963, Suburban Acres Library has

"We serve multiple generations of families," said longtime branch manager Sherrie Wallace. "Over time, we serve parents and their children with many of those children eventually returning to Suburban Acres with their own children. We have had the pleasure of assisting grandparents and even some great-grandparents who are raising their children's children. These generations of families continue to utilize Suburban Acres as they feel we are an extended part of their family."

When away from work, Wallace often is referred to as "the library lady" when customers see her in a store, school or some other locale. Longtime children's librarian associate Beverly Jemison also affectionately is called the same when she is spotted around town.

"We're definitely an extended family at Suburban Acres," said Wallace. "I have two young customers who even call me 'Grandma Sherrie.' I love being able to assist the residents in the community where I grew up. I love being a role model to some who believe that if they are from North Tulsa they cannot succeed. I love shaping and molding young (and even some old) minds."

It's no wonder its customers love Suburban Acres as the staff prides itself in giving extra attention to each person who walks through its doors. "We work to go above and beyond when requests are received, as we strive to meet the needs of a community that continues to experience a digital divide in regards to technology," said Wallace.

The Suburban Acres Library features 20 public computers, a

community meeting room, a seed library with seed packets available for checkout, plus a variety of programming offered throughout the year, including an After-School Homework Club during the school year, a quarterly Sista' Chat Book Club, impromptu storytimes and a newly established Teen Book Club. The Suburban Acres Library staff literally have watched 12-year-old Quincy Brown and his 9-year-old sister, Abigail, grow up. Both true-blue readers and accomplished musicians, the Brown children are homeschooled by their mom, Keyah. "The library definitely plays a role in our children's education," said Keyah. "While the library's technology does make a difference, the librarians add that personal touch." For Quincy, who has been reading



since age 3, the Suburban Acres Library is a home away from home. "I like that I am very familiar with it and that the staff know who I am. I feel very comfortable here."

For Willis, the best part about working at the library is that she loves "being a pillar in the community and helping people with things that seem simple to me but seem like trying to move a mountain for them. For example, typing up a résumé ... many customers get overwhelmed and frustrated until we reach out to help them.
