# Jack Gantos is Coming – hurray, hurray, hurray

ack Gantos, the 2014 winner of the Anne V. Zarrow
Award for Young Readers'
Literature, will visit Tulsa
on Friday, August 22 at 7 p.m.
The program will be held in conjunction with the Young People's
Creative Writing Contest event at
Hardesty Regional Library's Connor's Cove, 8316 E. 9376 St. Mr.
Gantos will speak about his work
as an award-winning author and
teacher, answer questions from
the audience and sign books for
families.

According to the Horn Book periodical, "Jack Gantos writes for the every boy in all of us, regardless if we are a boy or a girl."

Do you need just a taste of his work to get started? Just read one of his short stories in Guys Read, the Frunny Business anthology edited by Jon Sciezska. Another anthology, Half Minute Horrors, holds a notable short story by Gantos, too. These two short story collections can be found at your Tulsa City-County neighborhood library.

According to Mr. Gantos' website, he has been writing since childhood. His sister had a diary, which was his inspiration to start journaling at a very young age. In his youth, he was also a stamp collector and an insect enthusiast and would write his observations about his different collections in his private journals. He collected baseball cards, butterflies and "lots more good stuff"

as he was growing up. These personal collections became the stimulus for his stories.

Gantos owns over 200 personal journals containing his private thoughts about collecting, school years, cheap perfume and more. In one of his interviews, Mr. Gantos talks about going back to his childhood journals as inspiration for writing his popular children's books. He states that his classroom visits also gave him countless ideas and story plots for the *Joey Pigza* series.

Gantos taught literature in Boston after graduating from college. As a teacher of children's literature, he was inspired to write books for middle school boys, including the Joep Pigza series. His picture book series, Rot-

ten Ralph, was published in 1976. The series has received awards from both the American Library Association along with a Children's Book Showcase award. Today, most educators and librarians know Mr. Gantos for the 2012. Newbery Award-winning book Dead End in Norveit, which was also an Oklahoma Sequoyah Middle School Book nominee for the Children's Choice award.

His 40-year adult writing career is truly almost 60 years in the making! Those early childhood in-spirations from family, and his entusiasm for hobbies were the impetus for the body of children's literature that Mr. Gantos brings to readers today.

In an interview with Chilidensilit, he remarked, "young people need to be stimulated to begin the process of self-examination, and I find that readingli good books with strong, thoughtful characters searching for answers is one way to pursue a reflective life."

From Rotten Ralph and The Love Curse of the Rumbaughs to Dead End in Norvelt, the award-winning books of Jack Gantos touch everyone who reads or listens to his stories. Children and adult readers alike can relate to the familiarity of the characters he has given us in his writing career thus far. And we are all waiting for more to come!

#### **TULSA RACE RIOT TOPIC OF NEW NOVEL**

Tulsa freelance writer Jennifer Luitwieler's book "Seven D lys in May" is set during the Tulsa Race Riot. It follows the lives of two young girls who despite racial and class differences have forged a close friendship, which is threatened by the riot and a terrible secret that neither can ignore.
"I wanted to write about the Tulsa Race Riot because, as & woman and a non-native Oklahoman, I wanted to under-

stand what life was like then, "Luitwieler said." ... what led to the burning of 35 city blocks, and to advance a collaborative people behind the scenes in major historical events."

Luitwieler said that, as she researched the event, she four d herself wanting to know more about the lives of women and children during that time. Her novel explores the emotions and relationships of people as they might have experienced that horrific moment in history.
