Lowe's presentations are sponsored by the Tulsa Library Trust.

All Family History Month programs are free and will be held at the Hardesty Regional Library, 8316 E. 93rd St.

"Start Your Research @ the Library," July 1, 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., Computer Lab. Join Lisa Hansen, Genealogy Center associate, for an overview of the many helpful services the library offers to family history researchers. Registration is required.

"An Overview of the Civil War Records on Fold3," July 10, 6:30 to 8 p.m., Pecan Room. Experienced genealogy Civil War researcher Hugh Keen gives an in-depth look at the Civil War records found in Fold3, including service records, pensions and much more.

Plus, it is designated as an official FamilySearch Center, enabling it to borrow resources from the largest genealogy collection in the world – the Family History Center in Salt Lake City, Utah.

The Glenpool Fraternal Order of Police (F.O.P.) Carson Noteware Lodge #133 will host its 4th Poker Run on Sat. June 28 beginning at Glenpool's Black-Gold Park (100 W. 144th St./144th & Hwy 75). Glenpool officer Randy Rains said the F.O.P. expects between 150-200 people. Rid-

ers can sign up beginning at 10 a.m. Sat., with the last bike going out by noon. Cost is \$15 per rider and \$5 per passenger, with \$5 for additional hands. Stops include Pat's Place, Tulsa RV Ranch, and Jamesville-Y.

At each stop participants will draw a chip containing a number between 1-50. That will be the rider's score for the stop. The ride pays high and low hand.

Rains said, "They can have a cold drink, rest and hang out for a few minutes, then go on to the next stop." The ride ends between 2-4:30 p.m. at the Cigar Box on the Jenks Riverwalk, where the band Soul Shine will be set up on the patio. Food trucks will also be present.

"The raffle and auction prizes are good items," Rains said. "Our sponsors have always taken care of us." Hard
