Our regular storytimes continue throughout the summer on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings. My First Storytime for newborns through 2 yearolds and their caregivers is from 9:30-9:50 a.m., followed by Preschool Storytime for 3-5 year-olds from 10:00-10:30 a.m.

Explosion rocks Owasso neighborhood

Surrounding homes near an explosion were evacuated in the northern part of Owasso Saturday morning as Owasso firefighters and police responded to a home in the 11500 block of North 131st East Avenue, Owasso police confirmed.

According to police information, the explosion occurred inside the home where the male resident reportedly suffered severe trauma to his hands and the female occupant also received injuries, police say.

Owasso Police reported that a 13-inch homemade mortar shell blew up. Police also report that there was a large quanity of gunpowder involved. The home also had minor damage. Police believe the device was homemade after initially believing it was a manufactured device.

The Owasso Police Clandestine Laboratory Team found materials in the home that were similar to those materials used to manufacture items like pipe bombs and similar explosives. Owasso Police called in the Tulsa Bomb Squad to handle some of the gathering of evidence.

Two Owasso officers were overcome by fumes from the explosion when they first arrived on the scene, a police spokesman confirmed, and were treated at a local hospital and released. Police arrived on the scene at approximately 10:30 a.m. Saturday, May 31.

Officials from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) were on the scene Saturday to investigate, sources confirm.
