Throughout the month of March, universities and high schools across the state, will be letting out for Spring Break.

The Oklahoma Highway Patrol wants to remind students of the dangers of drinking and driving. Many students will be traveling by vehicle to different party locations.

OHP and other law enforcement agencies will be working to remove drunk drivers from the road.

The No. 1 cause of death of college-aged students is motor vehicle crashes with nearly 30 percent involving alcohol.
