
Top 10s from the New York Times Book Review May 6th, 2018

Fiction

- 1. *The Fallen* by David Baldacci. Amos Decker, known as the Memory Man, puts his talents toward solving a string of murders in a Rust Belt town.
- 2. *After Anna* by Lisa Scottoline. A woman marries a widower and reunites with her teenage daughter who is murdered soon after, and the husband is put on trial for it.
- 3. *Noir* by Christopher Moore. In the summer of 1947, a woman and an Air Force general attract the attention of a San Francisco bartender while a suspicious flying object is spotted near the coast
- 4. *Î've Got My Eyes on You* by Mary Higgins Clark. A high school guidance counselor tries to uncover the identity of her sister's murderer.
- The Female Persuasion by Meg Wolitzer. The relationship between a college freshman and a famous feminist reveals the challenges of intergenerational feminism.
- 6. *Little Fires Everywhere* by Celeste Ng. An artist upends a quiet town outside Cleveland.
- Circe by Madeline Miller. Zeus banishes Helios' daughter to an island, where she must choose between living with gods or mortals.
- Before We Were Yours by Lisa Wingate. A South Carolina lawyer learns about the questionable practices of a Tennessee orphanage.
- 9. *The Woman in the Window* by A. J. Finn. A recluse who drinks heavily and takes prescription drugs may have witnessed a crime across from her Harlem townhouse.
- 10. *The Great Alone* by Kristin Hannah. A former prisoner of war returns from Vietnam and moves his family to Alaska, where they face tough conditions.

Non-Fiction

- 1. *A Higher Loyalty* by James Comey. The former FBI director recounts cases and personal events that shaped his outlook on justice, and analyzes the leadership styles of three presidents.
- 2. *Fascism: a Warning* by Madeleine Albright with Bill Woodward. The former secretary of state examines the legacy of fascism in the 20th century and its potential revival.
- 3. *Russian Roulette* by Michael Isikoff and David Corn. Details the 2016 presidential election, with an emphasis on Russia's possible involvement.
- 4. *Fire and Fury* by Michael Wolff. A journalist offers an inside account of the first year of the Trump White House.
- 5. *Astrophysics for People in a Hurry* by Neil deGrasse Tyson. A straightforward, easy-to-understand introduction to the universe.
- 6. *Educated* by Tara Westover. The daughter of survivalists, who is kept out of school, educates herself enough to leave home for university.
- 7. *I'll Be Gone in the Dark* by Michelle McNamara. The late true-crime journalist's search for the serial murderer and rapist known as "the Golden State Killer."
- 8. *God Save Texas* by Lawrence Wright. An exploration of the history, politics, and economics of the Lone Star State.
- 9. *Make Trouble* by Cecile Richards with Lauren Peterson. A memoir by the president of Planned Parenthood Federation of America and Planned Parenthood Action Fund, and former labor organizer.
- 10. *Obama* by Pete Souza. More than 300 pictures of the former president by his White House photographer, with behind-the-scenes stories.
