Book delves into history of Osage Reign of Terror

"Killers of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI," David Grann's Edgar Award-winning best-seller about a series of murder in 1920s Osage County, has been selected for the Tulsa City-County Library's "One Book, One Tulsa" community-wide reading initiative.

The people of the Osage Nation were the richest people in the world per capita in the 1920s, thanks to the discovery of oil on their lands, to which the nation owned the rights. Such wealth very quickly made the Osage targets of a murderous scheme.

A former Texas Ranger turned FBI agent, Tom White, would ultimately unravel the tangled web of murder and deceit, but many questions about the murders remain unresolved.
