Jeffrey Howard, ninth-grader at Sand Springs Public Schools Central Ninth Grade Center, enjoys going to his neighborhood library, Pratt Library, often and is looking forward to Teen Tech Month events in March at area libraries.

Nearly two decades ago, Julie and Scott Ferguson moved to Sand Springs with their three young children, the youngest just 4 months old. Over the years, the family has benefited greatly from their neighborhood library, Pratt Library, as it offers a “gold mine” of resources and services.

“As an elementary Indian Education tutor, I find our favorite local library is a great resource for searching out just the right enticing book or series specific to the interests of my most reluctant readers,” said Julie. “Our two daughters, Claire and Kate, now away at college, grew up learning to love books because we were constantly at Pratt Library, and Kate enjoyed being a part of the Teen Team for a couple of summers. Once our youngest child, Paul, was old enough, he was excited to follow in his sister’s footsteps and become a Teen Teamer too.”

Though the Fergusons love Pratt Library’s wonderful resources and services, they value the staff even more and are especially grateful to Chris Lair, branch manager, and

Connie Krute, longtime children’s library associate, as they both have been instrumental in helping Paul gain valuable job skills and confidence – first as part of the Teen Team, and now as a weekly volunteer.

“In spite of some of the limitations of Paul’s disability (autism), they have helped guide him in so many invaluable ways: how to navigate a job interview, better understand punctuality, learn to use a timesheet, and to experience the joy of offering his skills to benefit others in a community,” said the proud mom. “He is always met with a warm greeting and a smile, and we know without a doubt that he feels valued as an individual within his neighborhood community as he serves as a volunteer at Pratt. We are so grateful for the library for changing lives.”

Established in 1963, the Pratt Library (formerly called Prattville) first opened in a trailer located at 3905 Walnut Creek Drive. Thirteen years later, Tulsa City-County Library replaced the Prattville branch with the brick-and-mortar Harry Pratt Library located at 3219 S. 113th W. Ave. in south Sand Springs.



“Our community is as beautiful as it is progressive, and our customers are more than just our customers – they’re our family and friends,” said Lair.

Krute, who grew up in the former Prattville area and still lives there today, echoes Lair’s sentiment.

“Pratt Library has been my home library since it first opened in 1963. I am a lifetime member of this community and I am sure

other members of our community would agree that Pratt Library is like a home away from home,” Krute said. “People come here to seek information and gain knowledge.
