CRIMINAL COURTS

When laws are broken, criminal courts are called upon to determine the truth and bring justice. Finding court records for your family and neighbors can provide a wealth of information for your research. Understanding the arrangements of court records can help you find the right documents. Often within these records family relationships are proven and circumstances stated.

Style refers to the Plaintiff and Defendants of a case.

Criminal Case Style

Criminal cases involve the commission of acts that are prohibited by law and are punishable by probation, fines, imprisonment, or death. The attorney representing the state, county or municipal government that formally accuses an individual of committing a crime is the prosecutor. The party charged with the crime is the defendant.

Steps in a Criminal Case:

- 1. Arrest Charge
- 2. Initial Appearance Bonded
- 3. Preliminary Hearing
- 4. Grand Jury Indictment
- 5. Arraignment in Preparation for Jury Trial
- **6.** Trial Opening Statements Depositions Witnesses Jury Deliberations Verdict.
- 7. Appeals Courts of Appeal Supreme Court (State & Federal)

National Union Catalog of Manuscript Collections (NUCMC)

NUCMC is a program operated by the Library of Congress. The database includes holdings in museums, archives, historical societies, and research libraries. Although the structure is controlled, persistent and careful researchers can use this tool to their advantage. Be creative in your search techniques after reading the guidelines and FAQ's on the web site. This site does not include all of the entries contained in the printed volumes. (1960-1985)

General Search Engines

Using a general search engine (i.e. Google.com) can help locate references to manuscript collections that contain references to the location or family surname you are researching. It may also lead to journal articles or other periodicals that may contain footnotes that will lead to other collections.

One can also use this type of general search to find online manuscript catalogs, which will lead to additional resources.

RG21 Record Group 21 - District Courts of the United States

Established: As elements of the federal court system by the Judiciary Act of 1789 (1 Stat. 76), September 24, 1789, pursuant to Article I, Section 8 of the Constitution, which granted to Congress power "To constitute Tribunals inferior to the supreme Court," and Article III, Section 1, which vested judicial power in the Supreme Court "and such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish." Individual district courts, minimally one for each state, established by specific legislation serve as the trial courts of general federal jurisdiction.

In addition to U.S. district courts, this record group includes the records of U.S. territorial courts, U.S. circuit courts, and Confederate States district courts. Jurisdiction includes criminal cases, tort suits by aliens, common law and equity suits involving the United States, suits involving an alien, and suits between citizens of different states. Appellate jurisdiction was transferred from circuit courts to courts of appeals by the Judiciary Act of 1891 (26 Stat. 826),
