Sharing and understanding heritage through storytelling

In recent years, Tulsa City-County Library has pondered the complexities of heritage months. On one hand, celebration and understanding of another culture and heritage cannot be normalized if highlighted just one month a year. On the other hand, heritage months uplift other cultures to the mainstream. Hispanic Heritage Month runs from Sept. 15-Oct. 15 and is built into school calendars, for instance, which helps drive traffic to relevant library programs. Still, it falls on TCCL staff to ensure diverse and intersectional celebrations are integrated throughout annual programming and not isolated to one month of the year.

When Amairani Perez joined TCCL in 2018 as the Hispanic Resource Center coordinator, she evaluated the Hispanic Heritage Month events being offered. At the same time, she began developing an award program for the Hispanic Resource Center. For Perez. the crux of both tasks was intentionality. Were the Hispanic Heritage Month programs checking a box, or were they offered because the community asked for them or could benefit from them? She applied this evaluative lens to what is now the Hummingbird Award in Literary Arts, too: What and who would it celebrate. and why?

Through Hispanic Heritage Month programs, TCCL aims to teach individuals not part of the Latinx community more about the culture while validating Latinx community members. "Especially when it comes to heritage, we don't want customers to come to a program just to do something. We want them to take something back that they've learned or that is validating about our existence, our identities," Perez said.

Narrative is a prominent theme in this year's Hispanic Heritage Month programs and the Hummingbird Award, which celebrates a Latinx artist whose work centers on Latinx experiences and encapsulates Latinx culture and perspective. September's Hispanic Heritage Month programs revolved around firsthand storytelling and Latinx communities reclaiming stories for and about them, and so will October's events.

The first September event was a community dialogue at the Philbrook Museum of Art. It was centered on discussing the influence and radical nature of the artistic movements in the U.S. and Latin America during Mexican artist Frida Kahlo's prime.

The second was a conversation with Tulsa Artist Fellow Francheska Alcántara, community organizers, historians and experts on people and the stories they tell.

On Oct. 6. a reception will be held at Martin Regional Library for the opening exhibition of *Exchanging Horizons*, a display of visual and oral histories of diverse voices from across Tulsa, in conjunction with the African American Resource Center. On Oct. 13, Alcántara will help TCCL host a storytelling workshop at Nathan Hale Library, which will focus on owning narrative and reclaiming origin stories.

Perez was excited about the collaborative aspect of this year's programs, such as

with Alcántara and the African American Resource Center. "I liked the idea of having the Hispanic Resource Center be mobile because it isn't just a resource for east Tulsa. We have a big Afro-Latinx community in Tulsa County," she said. and having Hispanic Heritage Month events at the African American Resource Center in north Tulsa represents the community that exists at the intersection of African and Latinx identities.

Perez also mentioned the importance of uplifting identities not typically thought of as coexisting or overlapping, like the Afro-Latinx communities highlighted in Alcántara's Ears to the Ground project. Ears to the Ground is a multimedia project that explores points of unity between Black and Latinx

communities in Tulsa. Representing these intersecting identities provides validation for those who identify as Black and Latinx as well as points of understanding for those who do not. Learn more about *Ears to the Ground* at www.interchangeartistgrant.art/artists/ francheska-alcantara.

The Hummingbird Award also seeks to uplift individuals at the intersection of various identities. The inaugural awardee is Benjamin Alire Sáenz, a member of the Latinx and LGBT+ communities. The Hispanic Resource Center invites all ages to celebrate this honoree at Central Library on Saturday, Oct. 29 at 10:30 a.m. Sáenz will accept the award, give a public presentation and sign copies of his books.

Sáenz was the first Hispanic author to win the prestigious PEN/Faulkner Award for fiction with his collection of stories *Everything Begins and Ends at the Kentucky Club*. He also was a recipient of the 1992 American Book Award for his first book of poems. *Calendar of Dust*. He is the author of Aristotle and Dante Discover the Secrets of the Universe, which was a Printz Honor Book; and his first novel for teens, Sammy and Juliana in Hollywood, was an ALA Top

Stephen Graham Jones is the New York Times bestselling author of nearly 30 horror and sci-fi novels and collections including The Only Good Indians, Don't Fear the Reaper, My Heart Is a Chainsaw, Mapping the Interior and Mongrels. His new comic-book series *Earthdivers*, to be launched in October 2022 by IDW, is set in an apocalyptic near future where four Indigenous survivors embark on a bloody, one-way mission to save the world by traveling back in time to kill Christopher Columbus and prevent the creation of America.

Jones has received numerous awards and honors including the Ray Bradbury Award from the Los Angeles Times, the Bram Stoker Award, the Shirley Jackson Award, the Jesse Jones Award for Best Work of Fiction from the Texas Institute of Letters, the Independent Publishers Award for Multicultural Fiction and the Alex Award from American Library Association.

He is the Ivena Baldwin professor of English at the University of Colorado Boulder and a member of the Blackfeet Tribe of the Blackfeet Indian Reservation of Montana, He lives in Boulder, Colo.

Inaugurated in 2001, the American Indian Festival of Words Writers Award recognizes written contributions of outstanding American Indian authors, poets, journalists, film and stage scriptwriters. It is the first and only award given by a public library to honor an American Indian writer. The award is given in odd-numbered years. Recipients receive a \$10,000 cash prize, provided by the Tulsa Library Trust and the Maxine and Jack Zarrow Family Foundation.

En los últimos años, la Biblioteca de la ciudad y el condado de Tulsa ha reflexionado sobre las complejidades de los meses de la herencia familiar. Por un lado, la celebración y comprensión de otra cultura y herencia no se puede normalizar si se destaca solo un mes al año. Por otro lado, los meses de la herencia familiar elevan el dialogo de las culturas con el publico. El Mes de la Herencia

Hispana se extiende del 15 de septiembre al 15 de octubre y está integrado en los calendarios escolares, por ejemplo, esto es lo que ayuda a dirigir el tráfico a programas bibliotecarios relevantes. Aún así, le corresponde al personal de TCCL garantizar que las celebraciones diversas y interseccionales se integren a lo largo de la programación anual y no se aíslen de un mes del año.

Cuando Amairani Pérez se unió a TCCL en 2018 como coordinadora del Centro Hispano, ella evaluó los eventos del Mes de la Herencia Hispana que se ofrecían. Al mismo tiempo, comenzó a desarrollar un programa de premio a la escritura para el Centro Hispano. Para Pérez, el cruce de ambas tareas era la intencionalidad. ¿Los programas del Mes de la Herencia Hispana marcaron una casilla de nuestras responsabilidades o se ofrecieron porque la comunidad los solicitó o podría beneficiarse de ellos? También aplicó esta lente evaluativo a lo que ahora es el Premio Colibrí en Artes Literarias: ¿Qué v a quién celebraría, y por qué?

A través de los programas del Mes de la Herencia Hispana, TCCL tiene como objetivo enseñar a las personas que no forman parte de la comunidad Latinx más información precisa sobre la cultura, y al mismo tiempo festejando representación auténtica para la comunidad Latinx. "Especialmente cuando se trata de nuestras raices, no queremos que los clientes vengan a un programa solo para hacer algo. Queremos que se lleven algo que hayan aprendido o que puedan ver su existencia reflejada en nuestros programas, y en nuestras identidades," dijo Pérez.

La narrativa es un tema destacado en los programas del Mes de la Herencia Hispana de este año y el Premio Colibrí,

que celebra a un artista Latino. Hispano. y/o Latinx cuyo trabajo se centra en las experiencias latinas y resume la cultura y la perspectiva Latina. Los programas del Mes de la Herencia Hispana de septiembre giraron en torno a la narración de historias y las comunidades latinas reclamando historias para y sobre ellos, al igual que los eventos de octubre.

El primer evento de septiembre fue un diálogo comunitario en el Museo de Arte Philbrook. Se centró en discutir la influencia y la naturaleza radical de los movimientos artísticos en los Estados Unidos y América Latina durante la carrera artistica de la artista mexicana Frida Kahlo. La segunda fue una conversación con Tulsa Artist Fellow Francheska Alcántara, organizadores comunitarios, historiadores y expertos en personas y las historias que cuentan.

El 6 de octubre se llevará a cabo una recepción en la Biblioteca Regional Martin para la exhibición de Intercambiando Horizontes, una exhibición de historias visuales y orales de diversas voces de todo Tulsa, en conjunto con el Centro de Recursos Afroamericanos.
