Printing Presses and Paintbrushes



Once upon a time, before the printing press, all books were made by hand. (In fact, the word "manuscript" derives from the Latin for "written by hand.") Medieval monks spent months painstakingly creating the pages of one book at a time, using exotic inks made from berries and ash to add "illuminations" – better known as pictures – to accompany the text ... which few could read except the monks themselves.

Today, bookmaking is mercifully easier and literacy is not just for the lucky few! Best of all, books with "illuminations" are as easy to find as walking into a public library.

The artistry of picture books is still something of an achievement to celebrate, however.

That is the idea behind Tulsa City-County Library's Books To Treasure program, sponsored by the Anne and Henry Zarrow Foundation, now approaching its 20-year anniversary. The goal is to celebrate the beauty and power of children's literature and inspire a love of reading in children. As part of Books To Treasure this year, the award-winning illustrator Katherine Roy will give a free public presentation about her art and creative process on Friday, Nov. 18 at 6 p.m. at Hardesty Regional Library in Connor's Cove.



Additionally, every second grader in Tulsa County will receive a free copy of the book *How To Be an Elephant*, written and illustrated by Roy. In fact, Roy spent many days and weeks in the wilds of Kenya observing elephants in their natural habitat so that her watercolor paintings would be as accurate and realistic as possible.

While this fascinating nonfiction book delves into such topics as how elephant families and herds communicate with each other (through powerful trumpeting and stomping), what they eat (mostly roots and other plants) and how big they get (for African elephants, up to 13,000 pounds), the watercolor artwork of elephants playing, eating and growing is what makes this book truly special.

Is that a baby elephant learning how to walk? Or the insides of an elephant's ultra-delicate nasal cavity? Look, there is a herd of joyful elephants running and crying out exultantly with the movement! All beautifully captured by the drawing and painting skills of Roy in *How To Be an Elephant*.

Roy's other books, such as *Red Rover: Curiosity on Mars* and *Neighborhood Sharks: Hunting With the Great Whites of California's Farallon Islands*, display similarly detailed, careful and up-close artwork of real-life subjects while, respectively, imparting knowledge about space exploration and ocean animals.

While she has traveled extensively around the world to research her books and illustrations, Roy spends most of her time in a house in Oregon with her family.

It's not a monastery, but she shares something in common with those longago monks creating books by hand: Her pictures are illuminating and the books she creates are extraordinary.

Five Fun & Fascinating Elephant Facts!

Elephant tusks are just modified teeth, but they work like forks and knives to cut grass, dig for roots and vegetables, and take bark off trees.

Elephants can smell better than they can see.

Adult elephants weigh between 7,000 and 13,000 pounds.

Elephants must forage for food between 12 and 18 hours a day just to get enough to eat!

La familia y la escuela tiene un papel importante a la hora de desarrollar la capacidad de comprensión en nuestros hijos cuando están pequeños y la literatura infántil es una de las mejores maneras que los más pequeños de la casa puedan adquirir nuevos conocimientos. Cuando enseñas el gusto por la lectura a tus hijos los beneficios son inmensos.

Leer es bueno para grandes y pequeños, eso no lo pone en duda nadie. Es importante que nuestros hijos reciban literatura desde la infancia, puesto que ayudará y determinará su comunicación oral y escrita, además es un importante instrumento para construir la identidad de los pequeños; canciones infantiles, cuentos, fábulas, trabalenguas, rimas y todos esos juegos populares eran parte de mi enseñanza en mi infancia y que son una tradición literaria que se ha ido transmitiendo de forma oral de generación en generación y que ahora se encuentran plasmados en libros infantiles.

El beneficio que atrae la literatura infántil son inimaginables y si es bilingüe es mucho más grande que la de un solo idioma, te puedo decir que los niños que practican la lectura a temprana edad se familiarizan mucho más con la escritura. el vocabulario, ortografía; mejoran la pronunciación de las palabras, así como su comunicación y expresividad oral y escrita; sus dificultades al aprendizaje son casi nulas. Aprender un segundo idioma es un objetivo que acompaña a muchos pequeños desde la infancia. generalmente a los niños no les gusta leer, pero si les enseñamos con el eiemplo ese desafió será mínimo para ellos. Si le interesa que sus hijos aprendan un idioma nuevo ven y visita las bibliotecas de la ciudad v condado de Tulsa que ofrecen la hora de cuentos bilingües. Descubrir y practicar un segundo idioma desde la infancia proporciona un conocimiento que abre puertas profesionales en la etapa adulta.

Cuando practicas un segundo idioma. los más pequeños de la casa descubren nuevos conceptos y términos mientras se adentran en una historia con la que se identifica. Los libros bilingües dirigidos al público infantil tratan temas con los que los niños pueden identificarse desde la infancia, checa nuestro Event Guide donde están los días, horarios y bibliotecas donde podrás encontrar el programa de los cuentos bilingües.
