After triumphing over the trials of a two-year global pandemic, Tulsa City-County Library stepped out in 2022 with a new mission, vision and building plan – all aimed at growing and strengthening our connections within the many communities we serve.

This idea of truly connecting with our communities resonated as an underlined theme of this past year. So much so, that it became the very mission that drives us. That mission is to inspire, promote learning and create connections that strengthen our communities. Our vision is to facilitate an environment where everyone in Tulsa County is seen, heard and welcomed. Our 24 library branches and Outreach Services are unique resources in their communities, reaching into every corner of our county. Because we want our community to think of us first when looking for information and resources, we want to continue to build the networks that help us activate our collections and resources.

That is why we have embarked on a new building plan, called *MY Library, OUR Future*, to replace four libraries – Brookside, Owasso, Rudisill Regional and South Broken Arrow – that are currently underserving their communities because of space and technology limitations.

We are now in the beginning phases of a capital campaign to construct four new libraries so that we can provide the next level of library service in these communities. These are among the most used branches in our system and replacing them with state-of-the-art facilities will ensure these communities continue to have a library that supports the future they want to create.

The designs of these new libraries will bring together inspiring aesthetics with innovative flexibility that allows each community to make the branch their own as needs naturally evolve over time. These new buildings will also help us expand our reach and welcome more individuals through our doors; they will improve our usability by removing barriers to access; and they will continue establishing the library as a convenient and valuable service and resource for all.

TCCL has always provided access to information, space and technologies for every individual in the communities we serve. By improving the scale and accessibility of our locations, TCCL can better connect each community member with the opportunity to reach and fulfill their dreams.

As you turn the pages of this annual report, you will see how TCCL connected with and strengthened the many diverse communities we serve and our plans to continue these connections throughout the future.

MY Library, OUR Future



TCCL kicked off the new year with a new building plan, called *MY Library, OUR Future*, to ensure tomorrow's TCCL will continue to inspire, promote learning and create connections that strengthen our communities. Four of TCCL's most used libraries that are underserving their communities because of space and technology limitations have been identified: Brookside, Owasso, Rudisill Regional and South Broken Arrow.

For the design process, TCCL spent several months gathering input and ideas from library users in these service areas; spoke with city council representatives, city managers, mayors and representatives from local chambers of commerce; and conducted a feasibility study of those in the philanthropic community. KKT Architects has been selected to design state of-the-art facilities that will mirror elements of the flagship Central Library while still maintaining the unique characteristics that make these branches special to the communities they serve. We are now in the beginning phases of a capital campaign to raise \$37 million

to bring these designs to life.

Easy Rawlins author receives Sankofa Freedom Award

During Black History Month, TCCL's African American Resource Center and the Tulsa Library Trust presented the 2022 Sankofa Freedom Award to Walter Mosley, one of America's most celebrated and beloved authors. Established in 2005, the purpose of this biennial award is to recognize a nationally prominent author whose lifelong work positively addresses the range and complexity of cultural, economic and political issues affecting the greater African American community. From his first novel, Devil in a Blue Dress, with its protagonist Easy Rawlins, to his latest short story collection, The Awkward Black Man, Mosley's work has explored the lives of Black men and women in America – past, present and future - and deepened the understanding and appreciation of Black life in the United States. Archie Mason inducted into Circle of Honor

To kick off the American Indian Festival of Words, TCCL inducted the Rev. Archie Mason, Osage and Cherokee, into the Circle of Honor at a virtual ceremony, held March 5. Mason was an educator for 34 years and one of the longest-serving members of the Osage Nation Congress. Induction into the Circle of Honor is a celebration of the honoree's actions in the face of adversity, commitment to the preservation of American Indian culture and legacy for future generations. "By offering programs like the American Indian Festival of Words, Natives see the library as a gathering place for them," said Teresa Runnels, coordinator of TCCL's American Indian Resource Center. The Circle of Honor award is given biennially by the resource center and Tulsa Library Trust. As a Circle of Honor honoree, Mason received a ceremonial blanket and a \$5,000 cash prize, provided by The Maxine and Jack Zarrow Family Foundation.

Talk, sing, read, write, play with Build A Reader app

Thanks to a grant from the Hardesty Family Foundation, TCCL launched a new Build A Reader app in 2022 to help develop early literacy skills in children from birth to pre-K, and grow and sustain a love of reading. Led by professional library staff trained in supporting children's literacy and learning development, Build A Reader storytimes follow the Every Child Ready to Read initiative established by the Public Library Association. The free Build A Reader app offers short, bite-sized videos demonstrating songs, finger plays and great book recommendations in thematic categories, such as "animals" and "feelings," to prepare young children for a lifetime of reading joy. The app also tracks reading and offers virtual badges, stickers and trophies after reading a set number of books. Use the Build A Reader app to talk, sing, read, write and play every day to help your child develop early literacy skills. To download the new app, search "Build A Reader" in the App Store or on Google Play.

Creating a community of readers

TCCL's Summer Reading Program connects people of all ages with their library, helps kids keep their reading skills strong, and promotes the joy and love of reading. The 2022 program "Oceans of Possibilities!" offered more than 700 free events, plus numerous incentives, including coupons for free food and entertainment from area businesses, and prize drawings for completing the program. With the help of presenting sponsors FC Tulsa, Mazzio's, Oklahoma Department of Libraries, Safari Joe's H2O, Tulsa Drillers, Tulsa Library Trust, Tulsa State Fair, *Tulsa World*, Tulsa Zoo, *TulsaKids*, Whataburger and Williams, TCCL reached more than 51,000 people, from newborns to adults, who read 301,156 books in all. The city of Collinsville was the victor in the Summer Reading Program Mayor's Challenge with the highest percentage of youth participating in the program - 34 percent of newborns to 17-year-olds in Collinsville signed up for the program.

Preparing students to succeed in school

TCCL teamed up with the Coalition of Hispanic Organizations, Tulsa Tech, Tulsa Public Schools and the Tulsa Area United Way, as well as more than 40 community organizations, agencies and local businesses, to help students and families prepare for the new school year. The sixth annual Back-to-School Community Resource Fair, held Aug. 13 at Tulsa Tech Lemley Memorial Campus, offered free backpacks filled with school supplies, informational booths and free services, including haircuts, dental screenings and vaccinations. Volunteers handed out over 2,200 backpacks in less than two hours. Library staff connected with hundreds of families about TCCL's After-School Homework Club and Homework HelpNow database. The After-School Homework Club provides free homework and test help for third through eighth graders at five libraries - Broken Arrow, Brookside, Kendall-Whittier, Maxwell Park and Martin Regional – September through April each school year. Site facilitators assist students with basic school subjects including reading, math, writing, spelling and social sciences. For the 2021-2022 school year, 58 students received a total of 342 hours of homework assistance.

The annual fundraiser raised more than \$2,500 to benefit TCCL's Ruth G. Hardman Adult Literacy Service.

Pilot program helps improve lives

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, workers who have earned a high school diploma make on average nearly \$10,000 more per year than those without a diploma. Thanks to a partnership with the Oklahoma Department of Libraries and Gale/Cengage Learning, five Tulsa County residents age 25 or older were selected in 2022 to participate in a pilot project, where they could earn their high school diploma at no cost through Excel High School. Once they complete the online, self-paced program, they will receive a diploma from a federally accredited, state-recognized high school. TCCL's Ruth G. Hardman Adult Literacy Service coordinates the Excel High School pilot program. More spots will open in 2023.

American novelist Ann Patchett saved the day when she graciously stepped in as the featured speaker for the 2022 Peggy V. Patchett, who won the 2014 Helmerich Award, returned to Tulsa Dec. 1 and 2 to speak at the 2022 public presentation and black-tie gala, held at Central Library. "Of all the galas I've done in my life, I had more fun in Tulsa by a factor of 10. I had such a good time. Part of it was that I was madly in love with Peggy (Helmerich)," said Patchett about her 2014 trip to Tulsa to receive the prestigious prize. Patchett said she was thrilled to come back to Tulsa and very excited to see the renovated Central Library, as it was closed for renovations in 2014. Given annually by TCCL and the Tulsa Library Trust, the Helmerich Award consists of a \$40,000 cash prize and an engraved crystal book.


