GROW YOUR BUSINESS AT THE LIBRARY

If you're going to pursue starting your own business, the only person who is going to hold you back from that is yourself.

- Trey Fields

Every business starts somewhere. ————— For some, that starting point is the library. While working at a physician's office, Trey Fields noticed that many patients, who had been referred to other hospitals and doctor's offices for medical tests or special services, weren't attending these appointments, even when they were crucial, due to lack of means or funds. Through his startup, Excel Imaging Diagnostics (EID), Fields wants to improve access to diagnostic imaging services like CT scans and MRI exams by bringing them to areas they currently aren't available.

Fields' venture is ambitious, but he believes anything is possible if you put your mind to it. "If you're going to pursue starting your own business, the only person who is going to hold you back from that is yourself. There are resources available to give you everything you need to get started," said Fields, who has been smart about using library resources like the Grow Academy to help him on his small-business journey.

* • *** * * * ***

The Grow Academy is a 10-month program that connects a cohort of 35 participants to library and community resources. Monthly classes, which include advice from industry experts and instruction on using library resources to gather data for a business plan and market research, began in October 2022 and will end in August 2023. Grow Academy classes are geared toward admitted applicants, but a number of walk-in participants are welcome at each event. Fields said the Grow Academy provided him with valuable networking opportunities and helped him build connections with peers and speakers at monthly events. The program also introduced him to online resources for finding information vital to his business plan, like financial and market analysis, consumer insights and more.

However, Fields credits library staff as the best resource of all, especially Heather Lozano, the former research librarian who masterminded the Grow Academy. "Heather extended her hand to every Grow Academy participant and follows up after each event to offer additional information, resources and support," Fields said. "When my peers have questions, the first thing I ask them is, 'Have you talked to Heather?"

This resource connection and staff support made all the difference for Fields, whose experience highlights the benefit of seeking help and the importance of resource access when developing a business plan. With tools like community connections, digital resources and library staff at his disposal, Fields is well on his way to making a positive impact on his community.

Without the vision of Lozano, who created and launched the Grow Academy in 2022, Fields' small-business journey might not have started at the library. In the sidebar to the right, Lozano talks about how the Grow Academy came to be and other ways TCCL helps small-business owners.

1. What inspired you to develop the Grow Academy?

The program was made out of a desire to connect local entrepreneurs to the amazing support for small businesses available in Tulsa and help make library customers aware of the many free resources we offer for building businesses.

- 2. Why is the library a good place to start if you want to open a business? TCCL has several resources filled with the data needed to build a business. These resources can provide information for building contact lists, conducting market research, finding industry trends and more.
- 3. What are some of your favorite resources for new business starters? Gale Business Builder is an excellent starting point for those who aren't sure where to begin because it guides the user along so well. Demographics Now is beneficial for market research data because it helps paint a picture of your customers and service area. Access both resources at www.tulsalibrary.org/databases.
- 4. How can the library help smallbusiness owners who did not get to enroll in the Grow Academy?
 Even if you didn't sign up for the Grow Academy, you are welcome to attend Grow Academy classes.
 Registration is required, so be sure to save your spot. TCCL also offers business classes once a month that are based on trending business topics.

Nuevos títulos en español para adolescentes

Mientras trabajaba en un consultorio médico, Trey Fields se dio cuenta de que muchos pacientes, que habían sido remitidos a otros hospitales y consultas médicas para someterse a pruebas médicas o servicios especiales, no acudían a estas citas, incluso cuando eran cruciales, por falta de medios o fondos. A través de su nueva empresa, Excel Imaging Diagnostics (EID), Fields pretende mejorar el acceso a servicios de diagnóstico por imagen, como tomografías computarizadas y resonancias magnéticas, llevándolos a zonas donde actualmente no están disponibles.

La idea de Fields es ambiciosa, pero cree que todo es posible si uno se lo propone. "Si quieres poner en marcha tu propio negocio, la única persona que te lo puede impedir eres tú mismo. Hay recursos disponibles para darte todo lo que necesitas para empezar," dice Fields, que ha sido inteligente a la hora de utilizar los recursos de la biblioteca, como de Grow Academy, que le ayudo a emprender su empresa.

De Grow Academy es un programa de 10 meses que conecta a un grupo de 35 participantes con los recursos de la biblioteca y la comunidad. Las clases mensuales, que incluyen asesoramiento de expertos del sector e instrucción sobre el uso de los recursos de la biblioteca para recopilar datos para un plan de negocio y un estudio de mercado, comenzaron en octubre de 2022 y finalizarán en agosto de 2023. Las clases de Grow Academy están dirigidas a los solicitantes admitidos, pero en cada evento son bienvenidos algunos participantes sin cita previa.


Fields afirma que Grow Academy le brindó valiosas oportunidades para establecer contactos y le ayudó a relacionarse con sus homólogos y ponentes en los actos mensuales. El programa también le presentó recursos en línea para encontrar información vital para su plan de negocio, como análisis financieros y de mercado, perspectivas de los consumidores y mucho más.

Sin embargo, Fields considera al personal de la biblioteca como el mejor recurso de todos, especialmente Heather Lozano, la bibliotecaria de investigación que dirigió de Grow Academy. "Heather tendió la mano a todos los participantes de Grow Academy y hace un seguimiento después de cada evento para ofrecer información adicional, recursos y apoyo", dijo Fields. "Cuando mis compañeros tienen preguntas, lo primero que les pregunto es: '¿Has hablado con Heather?"

Esta conexión de recursos y el apoyo del personal marcaron la diferencia para Fields, cuya experiencia pone de ejemplo las ventajas de buscar ayuda y la importancia del acceso a los recursos a la hora de desarrollar un plan de negocio. Con herramientas como las conexiones con la comunidad, los recursos digitales y el personal de la biblioteca a su disposición, Fields está en camino de tener un impacto positivo en su comunidad.


