# Meet Ben Clanton

## featured illustrator for the 2023 Books To Treasure

Ben Clanton is the bestselling creator of the children's graphic novel series *Narwhal and Jelly* and is the featured illustrator for the 20th anniversary Books To Treasure event. He will give a free presentation at Hardesty Regional Library on Friday, Nov. 10 at 6 p.m.

### What has been your experience with books and reading?

As a kid, I had mixed feelings about books. I loved the ones with illustrations! I could spend hours reading pictures. But words ... those were a bit tricky for me. It always seemed to me like reading words came so much easier to my classmates. Comics were something that kept me in the game. I'd read every single one in the paper. Even the editorial ones that I didn't understand.

My opinion about books with few pictures and many words would gradually change. I think my mom played a big part in making that happen. Even though I had decided I wasn't a "reader," she kept reading aloud to me. Eventually there was this certain series about a kid who finds out he is actually a wizard ... I couldn't wait to find out what happened next! So, I started to read the books on my own. I didn't become a "reader" overnight, but it was a start. I now knew how magical books can be!

### How did you become an author/illustrator?

I'm often at my happiest when I have a pencil and paper in my hands. That's been the case for as long as I can remember. But it didn't occur to me until I was part way through college that maybe I could make a career of it. I was volunteering at a neighboring elementary school and I found myself enjoying the books, such as *No, David!* by David Shannon,

*Zen Shorts* by Jon J. Muth, *Toot and Puddle* by Holly Hobbie and *Don't Let the Pigeon Drive the Bus* by Mo Willems, just as much if not more than the students I was reading them with. I found myself wondering ... could I make a book? What would it look like? I decided to try making one! And try and try and try ... and to this day some 30 books or so in I'm still trying and learning and hopefully getting a bit better at it.

### What do you like best about being an author/illustrator?

I love that moment when inspiration strikes! When my hand can't keep up with the ideas. When everything seems possible!

And I love seeing that moment happen for kids, which is why school visits are one of my favorite things. I swear I feel like I can actually sometimes see the sparks of creativity shooting out of them. It's an awesome thing to behold.

### Do you have a standard writing/drawing process?

Each project is a bit different but in general my process starts with getting to know a character. Typically, one that I've doodled in my sketchbook and for one reason or another just keep coming back to. I'll draw them again and again and ask them questions. I want to get to know as much about my characters as possible. I want to get to know them so well that they become real to me. Once

they are real to me their stories soon follow. So often I'll come up with a premise I'm curious about like "what if Narwhal met a Kracken ..." and suddenly the words and pictures start floating about in my brain and then flowing out onto the page.

It used to be that I'd write everything out first, but now I find I prefer to write and draw the book at the same time. Don't get me wrong though! Even if my initial drafts for a story come about quickly it is only because I've spent years with the character(s) already and there will still be a number of revisions to go after first putting the story to paper.

**Young people today have a lot of pressures and conflicts to navigate. What are you trying to teach or give them with your work? Conversely, when you talk with young people, what do they teach you, or what do you get from them?**

Fun comes foremost in my books. I want people to enjoy them and hopefully feel a bit lighter and sillier when they pick one up. I've at times compared my books to waffles ... sweet, maybe a bit odd/different, and something that hopefully makes you smile.





I'm not usually actively trying to teach or impart anything. That said, certain themes do tend to pop up in my work. Typically, things that I'm working through myself ... self-confidence, imagination, teamwork, friendship and inclusivity are some of the waters my characters explore in my books.

When I visit schools and meet kids at bookstores and libraries, it is so much fun to hear their ideas and see what they are passionate about. I find it very inspiring and it often sparks my own imagination and curiosity to new heights.

**What advice would you give to an aspiring young writer and/or artist?**

To carry a sketchbook with them everywhere. And let it be a place where you are free to explore! Where you can jot and doodle things down without judgment. A place to observe, make notes, daydream, list and wander! Creativity and imagination are like muscles. They get stronger with use!

# Second graders, get a special Books To Treasure library card, then meet Ben Clanton!

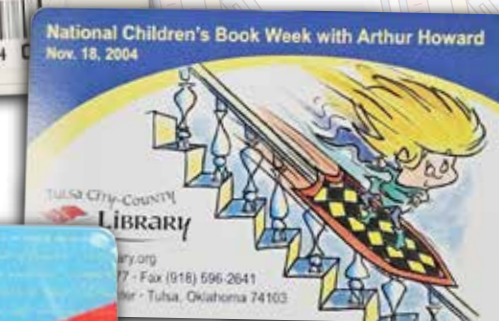

## SANKOFA FREEDOM AWARD

Honoring Terry McMillan

2024

**Friday, Feb. 9 • 6:30 p.m. • Rudisill Regional Library**

American novelist Terry McMillan will receive the 2024 Sankofa Freedom Award, presented by Tulsa City-County Library's African American Resource Center and the Tulsa Library Trust. The award, which consists of a \$10,000 cash prize and engraved plaque, is given biennially to a nationally acclaimed individual who has dedicated their life to educating and improving the greater African American community.

McMillan is known for her character-driven novels that appeal to various ages, races and genders. Her love of reading began as a teenager, when she shelved books at the local library. Previously unexposed to Black writers, McMillan immersed herself in African American literature in college, which inspired her to write books that encapsulate and normalize the experiences of Black women.

McMillan is the No. 1 *New York Times* bestselling author of 12 books, including *Waiting to Exhale* and *How Stella Got Her Groove Back*, which were both adapted into major motion pictures. Her debut novel, *Mama*, won the Doubleday New Voices award as well as the American Book Award, and her second novel, *Disappearing Acts*, became an HBO film in 2000. Her sixth novel, *A Day Late and a Dollar Short*, became a Lifetime Original Movie starring Whoopi Goldberg.

In addition to winning the NAACP Image Award and the *Essence* Magazine Lifetime Achievement Award, all of McMillan's novels have been *New York Times* bestsellers, including her latest release *It's Not All Downhill From Here*.

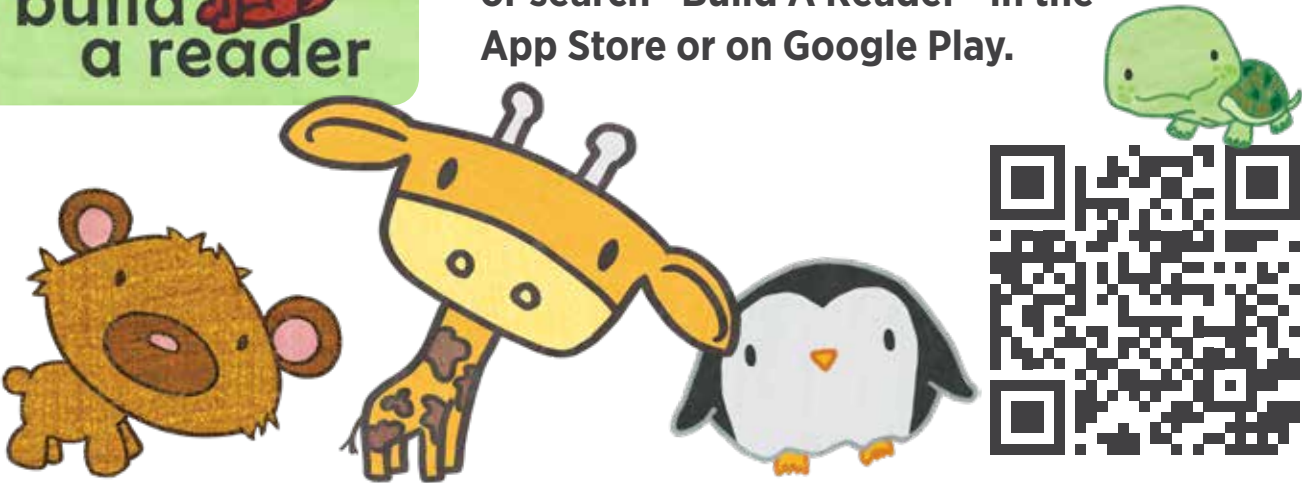

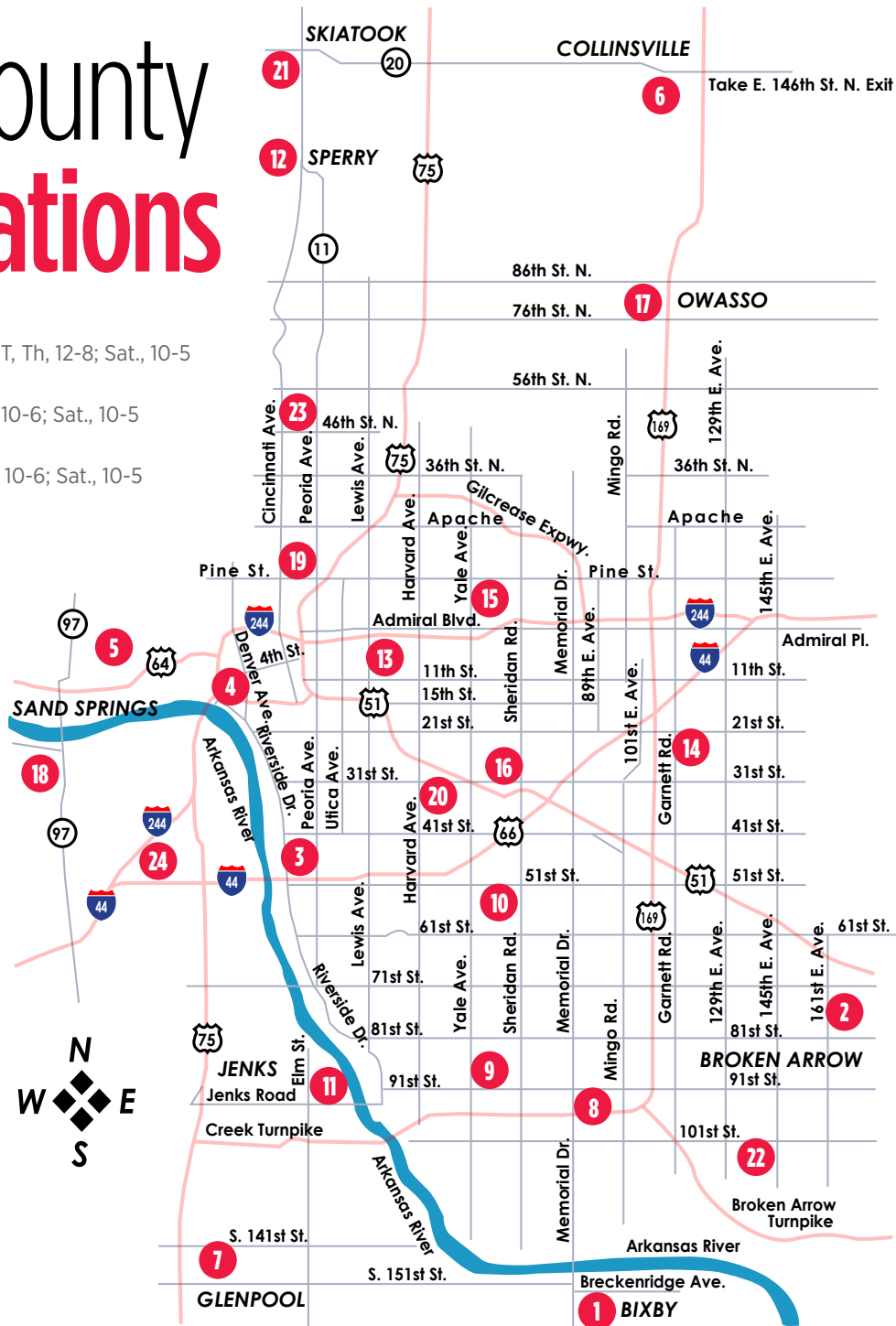
