TCCL Helps Make Homeschooling Experience Easier

Flexibility, personalized instruction, alignment with values and beliefs about education ... these are the main reasons many families opt to teach their children at home. In 2019, approximately 2.5 million students were homeschooled in the United States. After the COVID-19 pandemic, that number significantly increased to almost 4 million in 2022, according to the National Home Education Research Institute.

Karen and Greg Bryan are among the thousands of families in

Oklahoma educating their children at home. The Bryans work alternate schedules so that Karen can homeschool their 11-year-old son, Gordon, during the day. When Karen is at work, Greg does a variety of extras with Gordon, such as art, coding and Bible study, to name a few.

"Homeschooling is kind of a lifestyle, so you're learning in whatever you do," said Karen, who is a Tulsa City-County Library

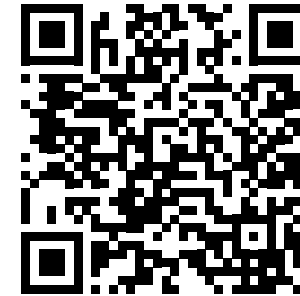
Research Services associate. "Homeschooling is hard; just schooling your kid is hard. People will start to homeschool their children and then they get overwhelmed."

To help make the homeschooling experience a little easier, TCCL offers a "Homeschooling in the Tulsa Area" research guide, available at www.tulsalibrary.org/homeschooling-tulsa-area.



This comprehensive guide is divided into the following sections:

- **Cooperatives (Co-Ops)** includes more than 20 area groups
- **Extracurricular Activities** includes local groups and classes for art, dance and gymnastics,



drama and theater, music, robotics, sports and athletics, sewing and needlework, plus a variety of other clubs and groups

- **Hybrid Schools** includes nearly 30 area hybrid schools offering a mix of homeschool and classroom time
- **Local Resources & Tutors** includes help for language, math, science and STEM, test prep and writing, plus a whole lot more
- **Homeschool Help** includes homeschool curriculum bookstores and local resources (including free online homeschool curriculum), Oklahoma homeschool laws, homeschool styles and methods, homeschool support groups (including more than 30 local groups), plus homeschool conventions
- **Field Trips, Fun & Meetups** includes around 30 places to

take a field trip and expand on your child's education, plus local and out-of-town fun and entertainment, and nearly 50 area meetup groups

- **Virtual Charter Schools**
- **High School & Beyond** includes info on college dual/concurrent enrollment, financial aid and scholarships, transcripts, graduation and fun (including proms and dances)

In addition to this helpful guide, TCCL offers over a million books, music, movies and other resources, including nearly 100 books and e-books, specifically on homeschooling. Visit www.tulsalibrary.org/books-music-movies to access the collection.

"Homeschoolers tend to be heavy library users. It's like having our bookshelf at the library instead of at our home," said Karen. "There are so many options for unit studies. Just pick a subject, read

and study about it, and then plan a field trip to expand on it."

For example, for a unit study on Western expansion, Karen read Laura Ingalls Wilder's books with her son and then they went on a



field trip to the Laura Ingalls Wilder Museum in Independence, Kan.

The Book a Research Librarian service is also a helpful resource for homeschoolers, said Allison Embry-Saenz, TCCL Research Services manager. "It's virtual, and kids and their parents can book a time that works for them. It's

"Homeschooling doesn't just happen at home," said Karen. "You can bring your family to any library and school them there. Assign a research assignment for your kids to do at the library. If you need information, just ask. Library staff are the information experts and we are happy to help!"

In addition, TCCL has many free research databases, including Culture Grams, Science Online, Biography in Context, eLibrary, Pop Culture Universe, Issues and Controversies, and the New York Times Historical databases, to name a few. Visit www.tulsalibrary.org/research/databases to get started.

Throughout the year, TCCL branches offer a variety of free programs, such as storytimes for younger children, STEM activities for elementary-age kids and more. During the school year, the Charles Page Library offers "Homeschool Fun Friday" for all ages on the third Friday in September, October and November from 11 a.m. to noon. Each program revolves around a particular theme and includes curriculum sharing. Likewise, the Glenpool Library features "Crafternoon With Roz" for teens and tweens on Wednesdays from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. Pick up a monthly

Start the school year strong with the after-school homework CLUB

Does your child struggle with their homework?

Do you struggle to find the time and means to help them?

Homework can be a source of stress for many students – as well as parents! Through the free After-School Homework Club, Tulsa City-County Library can help your child start the school year strong and keep that momentum throughout the year.

The After-School Homework Club provides children in grades three through eight with a positive, one-to-one learning experience.

Registering for the program provides your child with weekly 30-minute tutor sessions, and all you need is a TCCL library card! Sessions are offered Monday through Thursday from Sept. 16, 2024, through April 24, 2025, at five TCCL locations: **Broken Arrow Library, Brookside Library, Kendall-Whittier Library, Maxwell Park Library** and **Martin Regional Library**.

Almost half of last school year's enrollees sought help with all homework subjects, and a high percentage needed math help specifically. Because of their one-to-one sessions, more than 50% of the students said that their homework was less scary by the end of the school year and felt better equipped to do it on their own. Over 95% of After-School Homework Club attendees said they learned something new during their time in the club, and over two-thirds said their grades improved since they started getting help.

To enroll your child in the After-School Homework Club, register online, starting Sept. 3, at www.tulsalibrary.org/after-school-homework-club. Once an online application is submitted, the After-School Homework Club coordinator will contact parents/guardians to set up a time for them to meet with the site facilitator to complete paperwork.

In order to provide this much-needed service, the library asks the community for volunteers and homework coaches to work with students at any one of our After-School Homework Club locations. Volunteer homework coaches provide support and assistance to children in grades three through eight who need a little extra help with their homework assignments. These activities take place at one of the library's five After-School Homework Club sites: Broken Arrow Library, Brookside Library, Kendall-Whittier Library, Maxwell Park Library and Martin Regional Library. At each site, homework coaches work alongside the After-School Homework Club facilitators.


After applying, volunteer coaches are provided an orientation to library resources and are trained on how to ask children the right questions to best support their homework needs. Apply to become a homework coach at www.tulsalibrary.org/volunteer-services.

Volunteer requirements:

- At least 18 years old
- Must be able to commit to weekly 30-minute sessions, Monday-Thursday, Sept. 16, 2024, through April 24, 2025
- Must be self-directed, culturally sensitive and a positive role model for the children with whom they work
- Must be computer and internet literate
- Must be able to write clearly and concisely
- Must have a knowledge of basic school subjects including reading, English, writing, science and mathematics

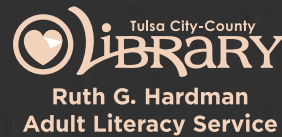

American Book Award-winning novelist and memoirist Reyna Grande will receive the 2024 Hummingbird Award in Literary Arts, talk about her life and writings, and sign books. Given biennially by the Tulsa Library Trust and Hispanic Resource Center, the award honors and recognizes a nationally prominent author, poet or artist of Latinx descent.

Grande is the author of the bestselling memoirs *The Distance Between Us* and *A Dream Called Home*, where she writes about her life before and after she arrived in the United States from Mexico as an undocumented child immigrant.

Her other works include the novels *Across a Hundred Mountains*, *Dancing With Butterflies* and *A Ballad of Love and Glory*, which is set during the Mexican-American War. She is the co-editor of an anthology by and about undocumented Americans called *Somewhere We Are Human: Authentic Voices on Migration, Survival and New Beginnings*.

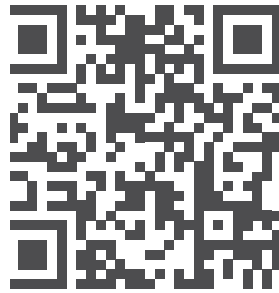

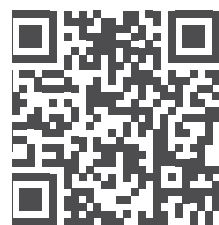

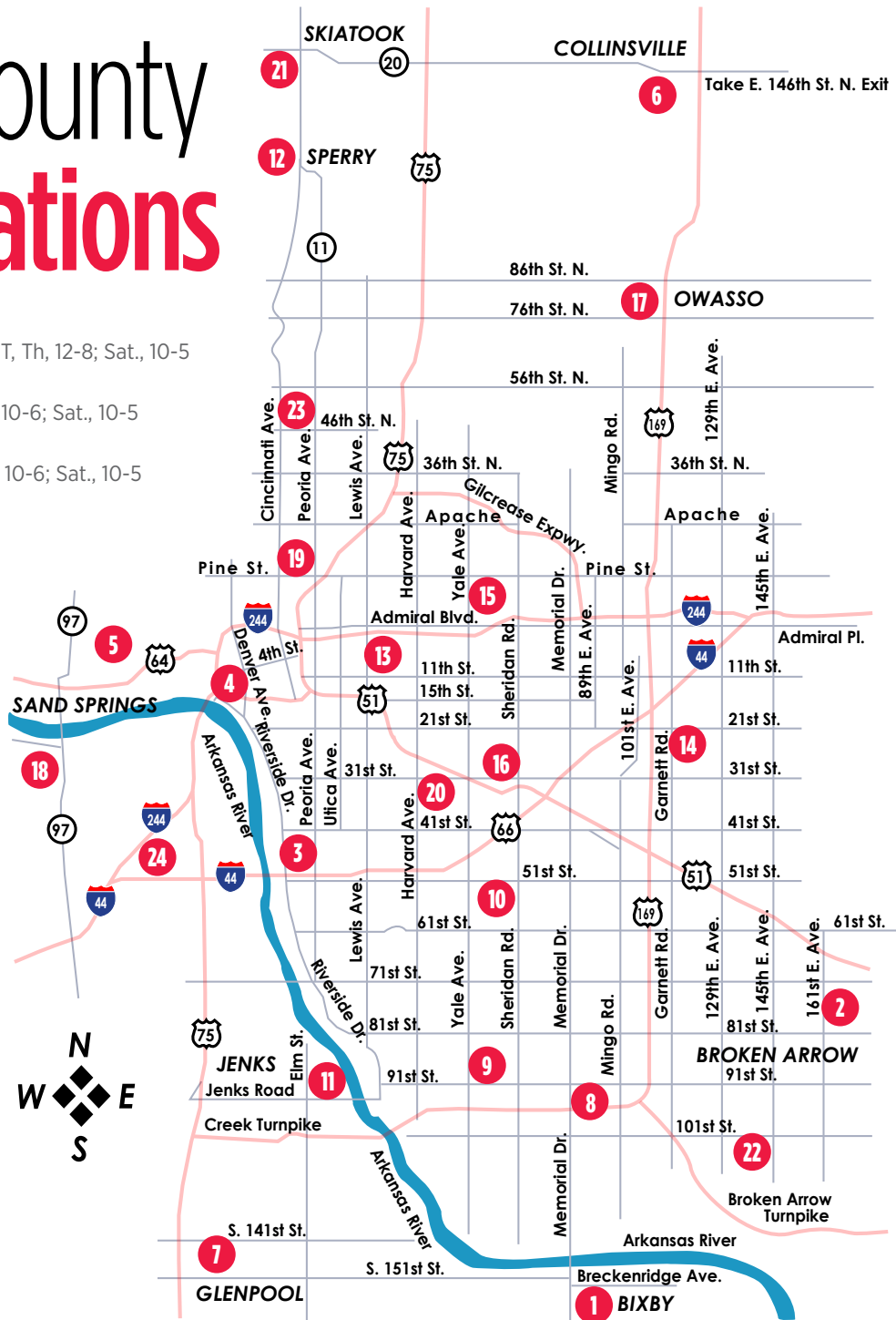
