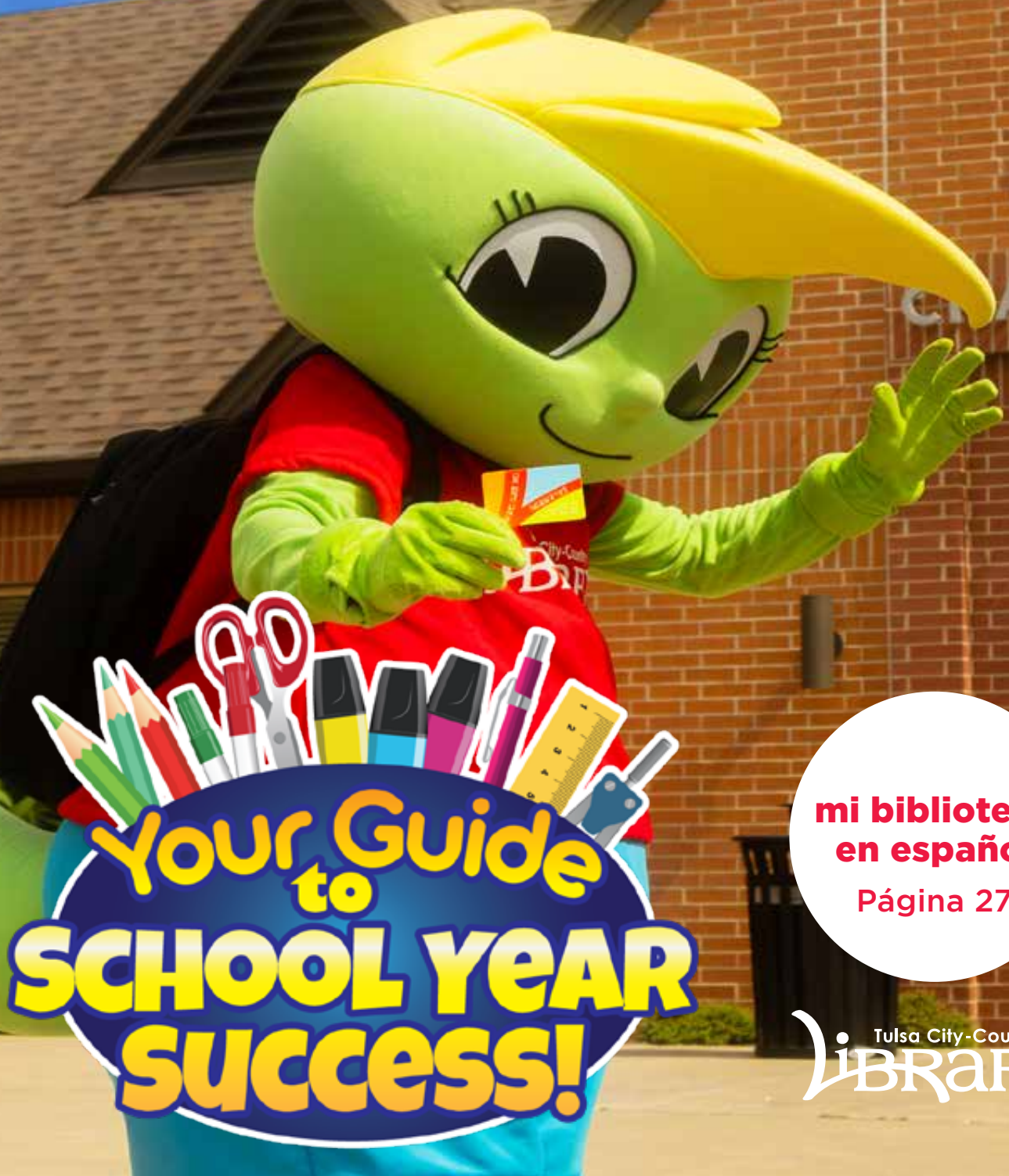

FOR ELEMENTARY / MIDDLE SCHOOLERS

Whether your first-time student is anxious or excited about starting school, our curated collection of children's books can help everyone get ready for the big day. Find it on Page 24.

If your child needs homework assistance, consider the **After-School Homework Club**. This free service offers one-to-one tutoring sessions for third through eighth graders from September to April at select TCCL locations. Parents and guardians must register their children online, and a library card is required to complete the form. Registration opens Sept. 2.

If online tutoring is a better fit, check out **Homework Help Now**. Through this free resource, students of all ages can connect online with real tutors for assistance. Tutors are available seven days a week in English and Spanish. Homework Help Now also includes practice tests, skill-building lessons and study tools tailored to individual learning needs.

FOR HIGH SCHOOLERS

Overwhelmed by the college search? Use **College Navigator** to explore more than 7,000 schools and get information on academic programs, financial aid, campus safety, student expenses and more so that you can make informed decisions about your next step.

As you prepare to apply to colleges, remember that a standout essay can make all the difference. Try out Homework Help Now's **Writing Lab** to get detailed feedback on any writing assignment or paper, including college admissions essays. Just upload your draft to receive personalized input from an expert in two to three business days.

If you're planning to apply for scholarships but don't know where to start, get help from library staff during the **Set Sail for Scholarships** events at Martin Regional Library on Aug. 16 and Zarrow Regional Library on Aug. 23. Learn more in the Teens & Tweens section of this guide.

For help navigating these resources and conducting research, try our **Book a Research Librarian** service and schedule a free one-to-one Zoom session with a professional librarian.

FOR EDUCATORS

Looking for engaging materials for lesson plans, projects or assessments? Our five ABC-CLIO databases, which include the **African American Experience**, the **American Indian Experience**, **Daily Life Through History**, **Pop Culture Universe** and the **Latino American Experience**, provide inquiry questions, worksheets, primary sources and citations organized by topic. And with **LearningExpress Library**, you can find educator tools and student practice sets for grades three through eight in every core subject.
