From community screenings and film production classes to hands-on music learning and recording, your library card unlocks endless opportunities for entertainment and inspiration.

Watch and Learn

Finding your next great movie is easy at TCCL. All locations offer physical DVDs, with collections that include family favorites, classics, recent releases, documentaries and more. Prefer to stream? **Hoopla** allows you to borrow and watch from home on your TV, tablet or phone. Visit www.tulsalibrary.org/digital to explore Hoopla.

Hoopla's BingePasses unlock collections of content for just one borrow. Scan the QR code to learn more and get movie recommendations from TCCL's Multimedia Specialist Connor Bock.



Some library locations also host movie screenings, which provide a relaxed way to enjoy a movie on the big screen and connect with fellow film lovers. Central Library hosts a "Monthly Movie Matinee" one Saturday per month, and "Movies in the Cove" offers free viewings most Saturdays at Hardesty Regional Library. Extra movie events are scheduled during spring break, March 16-20, at Rudisill Regional Library, Herman and Kate Kaiser Library, Glenpool Library, Central Library and Martin Regional Library. Plus, Rudisill Regional Library's Teen Lounge watches movies every Friday from 3:45-5 p.m. Learn more in the events sections of this guide.



For those who want to go beyond watching movies and learn how they're made, check out film and video courses available through **LinkedIn Learning** and **Universal Class**. With self-paced, expert-led courses, cardholders can explore every stage of the filmmaking process. Popular offerings in LinkedIn Learning include the "Become a Film and Video Producer" learning path, "Making a Short Film," "Learning Cinematography," "Video Foundations" and more. Universal Class offers courses in Adobe Premiere, Adobe After Effects and Final Cut Pro X. Whether you're experimenting with video for social media or developing a short film, these classes provide practical skills and creative insight. Listen and Learn

The library's music offerings go far beyond CDs — though those are available to check out, too! Stream full albums through Hoopla and access a wide range of genres and artists. It's a great way to explore new music, revisit classics or soundtrack your day. Find Hoopla at www.tulsalibrary.org/digital.

Interested in making music yourself? **ArtistWorks** provides world-class, self-paced music and voice instruction taught by accomplished, often Grammy Award-winning artists. Learn guitar, piano, violin, singing and more at your own pace. ArtistWorks is available through **Libby**. Use Libby at www.libbyapp.com from any device with an internet connection or download the free app from your mobile device's app store.



Deepen your music journey further with the **Audio Lab**, located in the Maker Space at Central Library. The lab is equipped with tools and software for recording, producing and mixing. It's the perfect place to try out industry-standard recording software such as Ableton Live, Audacity, GarageBand and Logic Pro X, along with professional microphones, mixers and audio interfaces. Customers can even experiment with instruments and gear like guitars, a bass and an amplifier. Learn more in the following Q&A with Maker Space Specialist Hector Arrazola.



What kinds of projects do people most often create in the Audio Lab?

We see a lot of things like podcasts, school projects and voice recordings. We also see music demos from solo artists who are recording vocals or creating new beats. We get to hear different genres ranging from EDM, country and hip-hop to live instruments like the saxophone or cello!

What's something new users are surprised to learn during their orientation?

Many people are surprised to learn that access to the lab is free. Typically, they expect a recording session to be expensive, but you can have access to high-quality recording equipment just by having a library card and attending an orientation. It often feels like a hidden gem because it's a professional-quality resource that people don't expect to find for free at the library.

How beginner friendly is the Audio Lab for someone with no recording experience?

If you know your way around a computer, the lab can be very beginner friendly. You don't need music or recording experience to get started. Our orientation and start-up sessions walk you through recording basics and the GarageBand interface so you'll feel confident working with digital audio workstations.

What's a memorable or inspiring project you've seen come out of the lab?

Recently, we had a grandmother record carols for her family as a present. She recorded the songs and included additional narration tracks with effects to create a story as the album progressed. She made some copies of the CD to give to her family and was very grateful for the opportunity to access a valuable resource.




