*America's First Daughter* draws from thousands of real-life letters and original sources to tell the fascinating, untold story of Thomas Jefferson's eldest daughter, Martha "Patsy" Jefferson Randolph – a woman who kept the secrets of our most enigmatic founding father. Randolph becomes Jefferson's helpmate, protector and constant companion in the wake of her mother's death. And



as scandal, tragedy and poverty threaten her family, she must decide how much she'll sacrifice to protect her father's reputation, in the process defining not just his political legacy, but that of the nation he founded.

### *Hillbilly Elegy* by J.D. Vance

From a former marine and Yale Law School graduate comes this powerful account of growing up in a poor Rust Belt town that offers a broader, probing look at the struggles of a culture in crisis – that of white working-class Americans. A deeply moving memoir with its share of humor and vividly



colorful figures, *Hillbilly Elegy* is the story of how upward mobility really feels, and it is an urgent and troubling meditation on the loss of the American dream for a large segment of this country.

### *Killers of the Flower Moon* by David Grann

In the 1920s, oil discoveries made members of the Osage Indian Nation the richest people per capita in the world. Then, one by one, the Osage began to be killed off. Here, David Grann utilizes years of research and startling new evidence to revisit the shocking series of crimes in which dozens of people were murdered in cold blood, and to serve up a searing indictment of the callousness and prejudice toward American Indians that allowed the murderers to operate with impunity for so long.

### *The Beekeeper's Apprentice* by Laurie R. King

Fans of Sherlock Holmes who are not familiar with Laurie R. King's ingenious Mary Russell/Sherlock Holmes mysteries will want to join us for a look at this, the first in a growing collection of more than 15 stories involving the fictional duo. Full of brilliant deductions, disguises and dangers, in this first case together, Russell and Holmes track down a kidnapped American senator's daughter and confront a truly cunning adversary – a bomber who has set trip wires for the sleuths and who will stop at nothing to end their partnership.

### *Devotion* by Adam Makos

For fans of *Unbroken* comes an unforgettable tale of courage from America's "forgotten war" in Korea. This is the inspirational story of the U.S. Navy's most famous aviator duo, Lt. Tom Hudner and Ensign Jesse Brown, and the Marines they fought to defend. A white New Englander from the country-club scene, Hudner passed up Harvard to fly fighters for his country. An African-American sharecropper's son from Mississippi, Brown became the Navy's first black carrier pilot. A tug-at-the-heartstrings tale of bravery and



selflessness, *Devotion* asks: How far would you go to save a friend?

### *A Gentleman in Moscow* by Amor Towles

Rostov, an indomitable man of erudition and wit, must now live in an attic room while some of the most tumultuous decades in Russian history unfold outside the hotel's doors. Brimming with humor and a glittering cast of characters, the novel casts a spell as it relates the count's endeavor to gain a deeper understanding of what it means to be a man of purpose.
